
FEBRUARY IS LGBT HISTORY MONTH


This year's awards to groups and services which benefit the local LGBT community will go

The awards will be presented by the Sheriff of Nottingham, Councillor Leon Unczur.

Before the presentations, people will be able to look at a DVD of this year's Pride March and displays set up by Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage and other organisations, such as Nottingham Healthcare NHS

Trust, Notts Police and Nottingham Register Office.

During the evening the Marilyn Monroe screen, mentioned in the last QB, will be auctioned to raise money for NRH.

Entrance, like the food and drink, will be free, but remember that the Ballroom will only hold 200, so latecomers may be refused entry.

THE COMMUNITY PAGE

C.H.E. stands for the Campaign for Homosexual Equality. Nottingham CHE group started in 1971 and fizzled out in 1982. During its existence it did a lot of useful work in helping better the situation for LGBT people. The enduring benefits of Nottingham CHE are seen in Lesbian and Gay Switchboard, which was started by CHE and Derbyshire Friend, which was an offshoot two steps removed from Nottingham CHE and Nottingham Switchboard.

Gay playwright and journalist **Peter Scott-Presland** is currently writing "Amiable Warriors", which will be the official history of CHE. 

There has been much research which demonstrates that lesbians and gay men have often got a raw deal from the NHS. Nottingham City and Nottinghamshire County NHS have produced the "In the Pink" booklet to address some of these negative issues.

The small print on the front page describes it as "a practical guide for GPs and other health practitioners". Copies will go to all GPs in Nottinghamshire. Its content includes the following:

- Tips for providing inclusive healthcare
- Local and national support services
- Useful documents, references and websites
- Good practice in the monitoring of sexual orientation
- Mental health
- Sexual health
- LGB issues relating to getting older
- LGB issues relating to cancer, smoking, drug and alcohol abuse

Some local groups (Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage, Breakout and Nottingham Switchboard) were involved in the production of the booklet, which was "launched" on December 14th at Beechdale Surgery in Nottingham. NOTTINGHAM BALL BOIS

Nottingham Ball Bois FC, Nottingham's gay community football team, will once again be organising events for LGBT History Month following a successful month of events in February 2011. The national theme for the month is sport, to coincide with the London Olympics. Events in 2011 included a launch night with the local gay community rugby and badminton teams and an 11-a-side inter-club match.

In recognition of the range of events held last year, Scott Lawley from Nottingham Ball Bois was invited to speak at the national launch of LGBT History Month 2012, held at the Oval Cricket Ground in London. Nottingham was the only city invited to speak at the launch, a reflection of the significant amount of activity undertaken in the area for LGBT History Month 2011. The audience included Equalities Minister, Lynne Featherstone, and Stephen Frost, the Head of Diversity for the London Olympics and Paralympics.

Closer to home, the Ballbois are founder members of the Midlands Unity League, a new league for gay community football clubs in the region. They are joined by teams from Leicester, Birmingham and Wolverhampton. The Ballbois will continue to play in the national GFSN League alongside the new Midlands League. The Midlands League will allow for more fixtures to take place locally, with more opportunities for club members to play competitive matches.

The Ballbois are always looking for new supporters and players, whether competitive or just for fun. 


1969 The Stonewall riots

Transgender and gender-noncomforming people are among those who resisted arrest in a routine bar raid on the Stonewall Inn in New York City's Greenwich Village, thus helping to ignite the modern LGBT rights movement

1970 February, 1970. Corbett v. Corbett (otherwise Ashley). The judgment by Justice Ormrod sets the precedent that will leave UK post-op transsexual people unable to marry until the 21st Century - In September 1963 the parties went through a ceremony of marriage. April Corbett's (neé Ashley) marriage is annulled and declared to be legally still a man despite sex reassignment.





1974 Jan Morris, one of Britain's top journalists who covered wars and rebellions around the globe and even climbed Mount Everest, published Conundrum, a personal account of her transition. The book is now considered a classic.

1976 Tennis Ace Reneé Richards is 'outed' and barred from competition when she attempts to enter a women's' tennis tournament. Her subsequent legal battle establishes that transsexuals are legally, accepted in their new identity after reassignment, in the US.

IMaurice Mills, a councillor for the Democratic Unionist Party blamed the gay community for Hurricane Katrina, which devastated New Orleans. He said "The hurricane occurred just two days prior to the annual homosexual festival."

The Rt. Rev Graham Dow, the Bishop of Carlisle, claimed that floods that caused chaos and death in 2007 across the UK were caused by God after he was provoked by the introduction of gay equality via the Goods and Services Act.

Shlomo Benizri, was speaking in Israel's Knesset (parliament) debate on earthquake preparedness. After reading passages from the Old Testament, he said that "A cost-effective way of averting earthquake damage would be to stop passing legislation on how to encourage homosexual activity in the State of Israel, which causes earthquakes."

CS2 Sauna opened July this year in Nottingham City Centre close to bars and clubs. The spacious facilities are set on two floors. Ground floor has the changing room with secure lockers which are big enough to get more than a pair of shoes in.

Once changed and wearing a fluffy white towel you can have a very nice hot power shower with even a cold one for the brave. Along from there you come to a large bespoke steam room.

There's a large Jacuzzi with mood lighting and a very big brand new 20 man sauna cabin which gets very Hot! From there you walk up a grand stair case with blue L.E.D. lighting. Upstairs there is a spacious cruising area with private rest rooms, cinema and a maze. It's all lovely and warm with central heating throughout the building. CIVIL RIGHTS AND GAY RIGHTS





There are those who say that Gay Rights should not be compared with anti-racist movements, such as the Civil Rights movement in the USA.

The picture shows someone central to the American Civil Rights movement, Dr. Martin Luther King. To his right is his wife, Coretta King and to his left is Bayard Rustin, the organisational "mastermind" behind much of the Civil Rights movement's work. Dr. King was, of course, assassinated. After his death, Mrs King made the following statement:

"Dr. Martin Luther King would be a champion of gay rights if he were alive. Gays and lesbians stood up for civil rights in Montgomery, Selma, in Albany, Georgia and St. Augustine, Florida, and many other campaigns of the Civil Rights Movement. Many of these courageous men and women were fighting for my freedom at a time when they could find few voices for their own, and I salute their contributions.

Homophobia is like racism and anti-Semitism and other forms of bigotry in that it seeks to dehumanize a large group of people, to deny their humanity, their dignity and personhood. This sets the stage for further repression and violence that spread all too easily to victimize the next minority group."

Bayard Rustin was a gay black man.
